## COVID-19 case numbers

- As of **Tuesday 30 March**, there have been **938** confirmed cases of COVID-19 notified in Western Australia (WA) and **60** historical cases. **918** people have recovered.
- To date a total of **941,359** COVID-19 tests have been conducted in WA.

## Living with COVID

### WA Health advice for **Queensland and New South Wales** travelers

Anyone who has arrived in WA from Queensland and New South Wales who has visited any of the affected [Queensland exposure sites](#) and/or [New South Wales exposure sites](#), during the relevant times, should:

- get tested immediately for COVID-19;
- quarantine at a suitable premises for 14 days from the date of attendance at the high-risk location; and
- get tested for COVID-19 on day 11.

Queensland transitioned from '**very low risk**' to '**low risk**' at 12.01am Saturday, **March 27**.

Queensland transitioned from '**low risk**' to '**medium risk**' at 12.01am Tuesday, **March 30**.

Under the 'medium risk' category, travel is not permitted into WA, unless you are an exempt traveler.

The exemption list is limited to:

- certain senior Government officials;
- certain active military personnel;
- a member of the Commonwealth Parliament;
- a person carrying out functions under a law of the Commonwealth;
- a person responsible for transport freight or logistics; and
- anyone who is given approval by State Emergency Coordinator or an authorised officer.
- compassionate reasons

Exempt travellers from Queensland arriving into WA from 12.01am Tuesday, 30 March 2021 must:

- self-quarantine in a suitable premise for 14 days;
- present for an initial COVID-19 test on arrival at Perth Airport;
- present for a COVID-19 test if any symptoms develop during quarantine;
- present for a COVID-19 test on day 11 after arrival in WA (if still in WA).

## State-by-state risk rating

All **other** jurisdictions **except Queensland** are considered 'very low risk' and are permitted to enter WA without COVID-19 testing or self-quarantine requirements.

They are still, however, required to complete a G2G PASS declaration and undergo a health screening upon arrival into WA.

## COVID-19 vaccination program

Western Australia continues to roll out COVID-19 vaccinations, prioritising those who are at highest risk of contracting COVID-19. These eligible workers have been invited, via their employers, to book in for a COVID-19 vaccination:

- Phase 1A eligible populations who have been invited for a COVID-19 vaccination include quarantine and border workers, frontline health care workers.
- Other health care workers, and groups of critical and high risk workers including police, fire and emergency staff, have already received an invitation to be vaccinated.

The vaccination rollout is affected by the availability of both imported and locally manufactured vaccines, however as more doses become available newly eligible groups will receive updated information about where they can receive their vaccine as part of the overall phased plan coordinated by the Australian Government. From Monday 22 March, the below groups can access the COVID-19 vaccine via general practices, Aboriginal Controlled Community Health Services and GP-led respiratory clinics for people within Phase 1B:

- Adults aged 70 years and over
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged over 55
- Adults with an underlying medical condition, including those with a disability
- Other health care workers
- Critical and high risk workers

Within WA, a [number of GP clinics](#) are offering the COVID-19 vaccine to anyone currently eligible for a COVID-19 vaccine. If you have not received an invitation to be vaccinated via your employer, and believe you are eligible for the COVID-19 vaccination, please use the Australian Government's [COVID-19 vaccine eligibility checker](#) to check your eligibility and make an appointment or register your interest via the Australian Government's GP vaccination program.

If you employ staff in your business, you may be wondering about your and your employees' rights and responsibilities in relation to the vaccine. The Small Business Development Corporation (SBDC) have published workplace information about the COVID-19 vaccine [FAQs](#) on their website. These FAQs provide general information only. It is important that businesses and employees seek appropriate advice about their specific circumstances.

## Testing

### General population [testing criteria](#)

Any person may be tested if they have any one of the following clinical criteria: fever ( $\geq 37.5^{\circ}\text{C}$ ) OR history of fever (e.g. night sweats, chills), without a known source **OR** an acute respiratory infection (e.g. shortness of breath, cough, sore throat, runny nose) **OR** acute loss of smell or taste.

The [Australian Health Protection Principal Committee \(AHPPC\)](#) is the key decision-making committee for health emergencies. It is comprised of all state and territory Chief Health Officers and is chaired by the Australian Chief Medical Officer.
