Western Australia

Voluntary Assisted Dying Act 2019

No. 27 of 2019

An Act —

- to provide for and regulate access to voluntary assisted dying;
 and
- to establish the Voluntary Assisted Dying Board; and
- to make consequential amendments to other Acts.

[Assented to 19 December 2019]


Eligibility

To be eligible for voluntary assisted dying, the person must meet <u>all</u> of the eligibility criteria. This includes that they:

- are aged 18 years or over
- are an Australian citizen or permanent resident who has been ordinarily resident in Western Australia for at least 12 months
- have been diagnosed with at least 1 disease, illness or medical condition that
 is advanced, progressive and will cause death; and, will, on the balance of
 probabilities cause death within a period of 6 months (or 12 months for
 neurodegenerative); and, is causing suffering that cannot be relieved in a
 manner that the person considers tolerable
- must have decision-making capacity in relation to voluntary assisted dying
- must be acting voluntarily and without coercion
- must have an enduring request for access to voluntary assisted dying

Aspects of the Process

- Minimum of two independent assessments by eligible medical practitioners
- First request, a written declaration and a final request
- Administration decision self-administration or practitioner administration
- The death certificate must not include any reference to voluntary assisted dying
- The person must be informed of many different aspects relating to voluntary assisted dying, as well as their treatment and palliative care options
- The person can withdraw or revoke their involvement at any stage
- Health practitioner may refuse to participate
- Restrictions on raising the topic of voluntary assisted dying





Other aspects of the Act

- Offences
- Enforcement
- Protection from liability

Organisation roles under the Act

State Administrative Tribunal

Reviewable decisions: ordinarily resident in WA 12 months, decision-making capacity, acting voluntarily and without coercion

The Voluntary Assisted Dying Board

Refer relevant matters to WA Police, Coroner's Court, AHPRA, HaDSCO, Registrar Births Deaths and Marriages, CEO (Dept of Health), CEO (Corrective Services)
