



Safe Infant Sleeping Policy

1. Purpose

The Safe Infant Sleeping Policy (the policy) sets the minimum requirements for the consistent approach to safe infant sleeping practices across the WA health system.

Safe infant sleeping practices and messages are used across the WA health system to reduce the risk and incidence of Sudden Unexpected Death in Infancy (SUDI). This policy promotes best safe infant sleeping practices through mandating safe infant sleeping training for staff and promoting key messages regarding safe infant sleeping.

This policy is a mandatory requirement for Health Service Providers under the *Clinical Services Planning and Programs Policy Framework* pursuant to section 26(2)(c) of the *Health Services Act 2016*.

2. Applicability

This policy is applicable to Health Service Providers that provide maternity services and child health services.

The requirements contained within this policy are applicable to the services purchased from contracted health entities where it is explicitly stated in the contract between the contracted health entity and the State of Western Australia or Health Service Provider. The State of Western Australia or Health Service Provider contract manager is responsible for ensuring that any obligation to comply with this policy by the contracted health entity is accurately reflected in the relevant contract and managed accordingly.

3. Policy Requirements

Health Service Providers must ensure:

- all healthcare workers employed or engaged in providing maternity, paediatric and child health services up to 12 months of age:
 - complete the Safe Infant Sleeping eLearning Package within 6 weeks of commencing employment.
 - complete the Safe Infant Sleeping eLearning Package every three years or sooner following major changes to the national recommendations eg Rednose
 - provide evidence based best practice safe infant sleeping education, recommendations and discharge advice to parents and/or carers on safe infant sleeping risk reduction strategies during the antenatal and postnatal period, including during home visits; and up to the infant corrected age of 12-months

- document the provision of safe infant sleeping education, recommendations and discharge advice in the patient's health record
- volunteers engaged to provide maternity, paediatric and child health services for infants up to 12 months of age undertake training regarding safe infant sleeping practices, prior to the provision of these services and every 3 years thereafter.

4. Compliance Monitoring

Health Service Providers are required to monitor their compliance with this policy by using the Safe Infant Sleeping Compliance Tool provided in section 5: Related Documents.

The Chief Nursing and Midwifery Office, on behalf of the System Manager, will require that Health Service Providers demonstrate that the relevant staff have undertaken the required training and provide information regarding the number of Severity Assessment Code 1 and 2 incidents related to unsafe infant sleeping and the actions taken to address the recommendations. This data is to be provided at the end of June each year. The information will be used to evaluate the effectiveness of the policy.

7. Definitions

The following definition(s) are relevant to this policy. For further information regarding key terms please refer to the *Safe Infant Sleeping Guideline*.

Term	Definition
Infant	Infant refers to a baby up to 12 months. In the case of premature babies, this is calculated 12 months plus the number of weeks they were preterm (one-year corrected age).
Healthcare workers	Refers to any person or organisation that is involved in or associated with the delivery of healthcare to a client or caring for client wellbeing.
Sudden Unexpected Death in Infancy (SUDI)	SUDI is a broad term used to describe the sudden and unexpected death of a baby up to the age of 12 months, for which the cause is not immediately obvious after a thorough investigation.

WA health system	<p>The WA health system is comprised of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) the Department; (ii) Health Service Providers (North Metropolitan Health Service, South Metropolitan Health Service, Child and Adolescent Health Service, WA Country Health Service, East Metropolitan Health Service, PathWest Laboratory Medicine WA, Quadriplegic Centre and Health Support Services); and (iii) contracted health entities, to the extent they provide health services to the State.
