0725/91 Non-invasive ventilation devices

WA Coding Rule 1110/10 *Non-invasive ventilation devices* is retired.

In Ninth Edition, ACS 1006 *Ventilatory support* was updated to clarify that use of a non-invasive ventilation device doesn't necessarily equate to administration of non-invasive ventilation. See ACS 1006 *Ventilatory support/Note 2*.

ACS 1006 *Ventilatory Support* lists the following devices used for non-invasive ventilation: face mask, mouthpiece, nasal mask, nasal pillows, nasal prongs, nasal tubes and nasopharyngeal tubes. When use of these devices is documented, should non-invasive ventilation be coded?

A.

Use of the devices listed above does not necessarily indicate ventilation - these devices can be used to administer oxygen which is not coded. Non-invasive ventilation involves a machine which assists respiration, which is connected to a device to administer the ventilatory support. Non-invasive are all modalities other than ETT or tracheostomy. Ensure ventilation e.g. CPAP, BiPAP, IPPV etc. is documented before assigning a non-invasive ventilation code.

DECISION

Ensure ventilation is documented before assigning a code for non-invasive ventilation e.g. via face mask, mouthpiece, nasal mask, nasal pillows, nasal prongs, nasal tubes or nasopharyngeal tubes.
