THE BURNING ISSUES

From a large number of identified concerns, the following burning issues stood out:

- Silos within the Health system between health services, workforces, Health and Disability Services, Commonwealth and State services
- The need for a greater emphasis on preventative health through re-orienting services, a focus on early intervention, promotion of selfmanagement and endorsement of community developed and driven programs
- Reducing wastage in the system due to duplication of services, slow introduction of new technologies and continuation of ineffective clinical interventions
- The need for new ways to keep people in their homes and avoid expensive hospital services
- Better use of the Health workforce in ways that utilise the expertise and capacity available
- Inequity in access to health care, particularly for country people accessing metropolitan support facilities

THE CRITICAL CONVERSATIONS THAT WE MUST HAVE

- Managing expectations so that community members have realistic expectations about what the Health system can and cannot provide
- A focus on the determinants of health such as inequality, housing and education by incorporating health in all policies rather than fixing immediate health and illness services
- Long term planning for infrastructure, systems and workforce to increase integration and collaboration between public and private health systems
- Recognition of professional skill sets, the changing role of professionals, and the perceived threat to professional bodies
- The euthanasia discussion and support for end of life, self-directed solutions

SUGGESTIONS FOR MANAGING EXPECTATIONS

- Working with communities to engage meaningfully and co-produce expectations and outcomes
- Incentivise the community to be active and to proactively engage with preventative health
- Promote consumer rights, stronger advocacy and increased education services
- Increase information and transparency around the cost of health care, the wait time and the delays
- Ensure an effective and efficient public health system as a fundamental level of care for everyone







SUGGESTIONS FOR A FOCUS ON SOCIAL DETERMINANTS

- Offer annual health checks and more respite support to recognised carers to avoid impacting on the carers' health
- Increase public literacy around the social determinants of health
- Increase education and awareness of social determinants of health within Government and non-Government providers and apply the Carers Recognition Act across Government Departments and Agencies
- Extend and strengthen the use of KPIs related to the social determinants of health across all Government sectors and Departments
- Significantly increase Health Practitioner input into Health education in schools

SUGGESTIONS FOR COLLABORATION AND INTEGRATION

- Embrace and use existing systems such as Health Pathways to de-silo
 Health
- Enable rapid transfer of information through secure messaging systems, eHealth and community hubs to upload and download data
- Incentivise collaboration between systems and services, rather than accept competition
- Support and encourage Local Government to promote health and wellbeing and encourage service collaboration
- Challenge the gatekeepers and confront the need for change within the system





SUGGESTIONS FOR END OF LIFE CARE, PLUS HEALTH PROMOTION

- Increase community education about palliative care, end of life care and futile treatments
- Actively promote advanced healthcare directives and lead by example
- Co-produce health promotion campaigns with communities and cohorts
- Address obesity as a major concern for our community
