NursePrac Australia is providing a new, innovative style of paediatric healthcare in shared care model with Fiona Stanley Hospital paediatric services. NursePrac Australia has developed strong links with hospitals, Child and Adolescent Community Health, the local government sector and community health and welfare providers.

Populations of focus

Enhance health and quality of life for children and young people with chronic conditions by:

- o Supporting healthcare closer to home
- o Reducing unnecessary referrals to secondary/tertiary care
- o Early intervention
- Educating children, young people and their families about chronic health conditions and promoting self-care

Improve the healthcare for children and young people in out-of-home care through:

- o Health assessment and screening
- Linking to primary care providers
- o Reassessment at key life points
- o Education for carers regarding management of health and wellbeing

Support general practice with children's healthcare via:

- o Access to a skilled paediatric workforce in the primary care setting
- o Providing an avenue to review non-urgent paediatric presentations

This fledging model has been operating for 7 months. It is very popular with patients and families (evidenced by family satisfaction ratings over 90%); it is highly regarded by referrers; it is already demonstrating statistically significant outcomes; it has reduced the need for tertiary heathcare referrals and is receiving clients redirected from secondary and tertiary hospitals that benefit from our unique intensive education, family empowerment and supportive approach.

Frustratingly, nurse practitioners remain severely underutilised across the WA health system, mainly due to a lack of employment opportunities and limited vision by health services. To date, **none** of the nurse practitioners contracting for NursePrac Australia were working full-time as nurse practitioners in their previous positions, indeed most were working at significantly lower clinical levels.

Furthermore, funding is an issue, as independent nurse practitioners are poorly remunerated by the 4 timed MBS items available to nurse practitioners. This means that even though these nurse practitioners provide high quality care at a potentially lower cost to health care systems, their success depends on whether a sufficient number of their patients are willing and able to pay "out of pocket". This creates systemic marginalisation of nurse practitioners and challenges state and federal governments to contest the provider monopoly on the delivery of health services or to incentive care delivery for needier populations.

Nurse practitioners and other advanced practice healthcare professionals are ideally situated to fill gaps in healthcare provision, especially for underserved populations. Nurse practitioners in WA are increasingly owning and running their own healthcare services. These nurse practitioners collaborate with medical colleagues to provide innovative models of care, offering a greater range of healthcare choice to consumers and care closer to home.

Understanding the roles of Nurse Practitioners:

- Nurse Practitioners are advanced practice nurses with an additional Master's Degree, who have usually worked for over 10 years in their speciality area.
- Nurse Practitioners can prescribe medications including PBS, authority and private prescriptions.
- Nurse Practitioners can claim Medicare rebates.
- Nurse practitioners' can order a range of diagnostic imaging and pathology tests.
- Nurse practitioners can refer to medical specialists.

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- Medical practitioners can refer to nurse practitioners.
- Nurse practitioners don't need a medical referral and many patients/families self-refer.
